From the Pastor

Psalm 46 declares that God is our help and refuge in times of trouble, and our only lasting hope in the world. "Therefore we will not fear though the earth should change, though the mountains shake...The nations rage, the kingdoms totter... 'Be still, and know that I am God.' The Lord of hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge." (portions of Psalm 46)

As the political conventions seem determined to stir up hatred and controversy and become particularly obsessed with condemning whoever is opponent, I find it disheartening. Our world is challenging, but as I listened to the "Christians" who tout their religious values so loudly, I found to hear much love and instead hear warning after warning about how terrible and dangerous our world is.

What about our hope in God? What about Jesus' call for us to pray for our enemies? (Matthew 5:43-45) What about the Bible's persistent declaration that God wants justice for the poor and those who are not powerfully connected in society? (*Is not this the fast I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house...* - Isaiah 58:6-7) I could not hear much in terms of the Bible as I listened to all the scare tactics and putting down of others.

"The nations rage, the kingdoms totter." Think of how many "kingdoms" God has seen totter throughout the centuries! So many of them got trapped into thinking that they were the best, that they had made their own power, that they could dominate and own the world. However they knew God, they tended to forget about God and became satisfied with themselves. Smugness and self-satisfaction are dangerous, especially when it comes to the leaders of any nation.

The nations will rage, the politicians will hurl insults and names at each other, and kingdoms, even ours some day, will totter, but God is God, and God is our refuge, strength and help in any and all times.

We must not put our faith in any man or woman; all are fragile. We must ask God to help us discern our voting and then we must constantly hold our leaders (whoever they are!!) in prayer. Our hope is in God, for God will be here long after we are all but a memory. "Therefore we will not fear though the earth should change,... for God is with us!" As we listen to the claims and chaos of the world and deal with our everyday challenges, burdens and joys, let us remember that God is in our midst. As it says in the Faith Statement # 883 in our hymnal: "In life, in death, in life beyond death, God is with us. We are not alone. Thanks be to God!" Amen. -

History Of Our Church –

The New Church Building

The need of a new church edifice had long been felt by the Methodists of Winsted, and several attempts to secure suitable funds for the erection of such a building had been made. These attempts although unsuccessful, so far as their main purpose was concerned, were far from being fruitless. A fund of nearly \$2,500. Including \$1,000. Willed to the society by Philo Sheldon had been secured, while the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, which had pledged \$1,500. In 1892, had raised about \$1,400. Of the amount. Thus the society had the nucleus of a building fund amounting to nearly \$4,000. But it also had a bonded and floating debt of \$4,000., most of which it had been carrying for something more than twenty years, since the parsonage was built on High Street. When the present Pastor was appointed to the

charge in 1899, he felt that the indebtedness of \$4,000., was the first obstacle to be removed, preliminary to the building of a new church. About a year after this amount had been secured in the autumn of 1901, he made a proposition to the official board, which was accepted, that, providing the sum of \$30,000. Could be secured in good pledges before the first of January, 1902, the society should erect a new house of worship.

Our collection plates often drop in volume over the summer months. Like many of us on a regular income, be it a paycheck or pension, we depend on the regularity of income. So also does the Winsted United Methodist Church.

Vacation travel, sporting events and sometimes just plain hot and steamy weather keeps us from attending summer morning worship services. We need to insure that our summer activities don't hamper our church's obligations.

Having our offering envelopes, date labeled for weekly giving helps us. When absent on a Sunday, the dated envelope not used, reminds us that "an offering" ought to be placed in it for the benefit of our church; our church's "irregular paycheck"!

As we must know, stewardship is the privilege of responding to God's love with thanksgiving and gratitude. All that we are, all that we have, are gifts from God. We are stewards of these gifts - the time, talent and treasure that God has entrusted to our care. In thanksgiving, we joyously return a portion of these gifts to God, and God's creation.

Treasure, or money is only a part of our total gifts, yet money is so important to the general operation of the church, which does tend to see a short fall in the summer months. That said, and as the Apostle Paul states, "Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver"

Keeping up a regular rate of our giving, is one way to cheerfully give. As the suggested reading also says, the more we do this, the more we may expect in return. It works, try it!
